Hunting Club Code of Ethics

I. Wildlife Conservation

Hunting is an integral part of wildlife conservation. I pledge to hunt in accordance with conservation laws and rules. I will insist that my guests and my club obey all hunting laws. There will be no tolerance of violation in my club.

II. Safety

Hunting is a great experience when done safely. I pledge to hunt with safety first in mind at all times. I will instruct my guests to hunt safely and insist that my club have safety rules that all members follow. Close calls, injuries, and tragedies ruin the hunting experience. I will not hunt near any active forestry operations which I acknowledge have priority over hunting activities.

III. Respect for Hunting Property

It is at the landowner's pleasure that I am allowed to hunt and enjoy the use of the property. My hunting club pays a very modest fee for the privilege to hunt when considering the total value of the property. Timber management activities (including timber cutting, helicopter operations, tree planting and other operations) have priority over all other activities including hunting. I pledge to respect the owner's property and not litter, shoot signs, damage trees, set fires, or damage roads. I will help to keep the appearance of the property at high standards. I will pay my membership fees on schedule, so my club can make its payment in a timely, businesslike manner.

IV. Respect and Courtesy towards neighbors

It is the policy of the landowner to be good neighbors with neighboring property owners. I pledge to help the landowner be a good neighbor by being courteous and respectful to neighboring landowner's and their interest. I will not go onto a neighbor's property without their permission. I will not competitively hunt along property lines or near neighbor's food plots or hunting stands causing conflicts and ill feelings with neighbors. My club and I will be proactive in working with neighbors to resolve any hunting conflict that arise. If the landowner allows our club to dog hunt, I understand that it will be allowed only as the neighbor's don't have issues with dogs crossing onto their property. It is the club's responsibility to work with neighbors on dog hunting issues. I will be courteous and professional when approaching strangers on property and asking if they have permission to be there since many other people have rights to enter the property.

V. Assist Landowner with Forest Protection

One value a hunting club can add is being the eyes and ears of the property owner. My club agrees to report any fires, dumping, beetle damage, encroachments on property lines, gate problems or other issues to their HEM forester.
